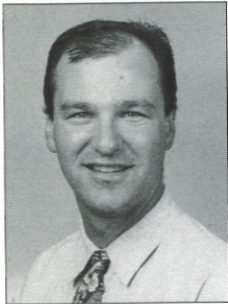

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## Remembering Elsie

On June 18, 1999, the PT Department lost a treasured member of its family when Elsie McDaniel died from cancer at age 77.

Elsie began working in the department in September 1962 primarily as the administrative assistant to the department chair until she retired in March 1984. Early on, she worked part-time so that she could be home when her children—Susan, Jeffrey and David—returned from school.

Ruth Latimer, department chair from 1962-70, describes Elsie as being friendly, organized, efficient and conscientious.

“She was a jack-of-all-trades,” recalls Latimer. “We were all fond of her.”

Elsie also worked for Dr. Clarence Hardiman, retired department chair. Dr. Hardiman says that what epitomized Elsie was her absolute precision directed toward her work.

“Elsie was just world class as a secretary. She was extremely professional,” says Dr. Hardiman. “She was dedicated to her job and committed to the department.... We owe a lot to her.”

Dr. Donald Hobart, retired assistant chairman, agrees. “She always had a smile and was a happy individual. And she was extremely efficient. She knew the

department inside and out,” he says. “She was a wonderful individual. It was lonely after she left—for quite a while.”

But Elsie was more than just efficient; she also knew how to have fun. When she retired, the department gave her golf lessons. And she took them.

“She was particularly active,” says Latimer. “If she wasn’t playing tennis, she was playing golf and, in between, she was playing Bridge.”

Elsie not only played Bridge, but also taught it. She played ping-pong and loved tending her flower garden. Husband Larry McDaniel describes her as “a lady who was interested in everything.”

Bobbie di Sabatino, retired executive administrative assistant, and Terry Heron, secretary for the Admissions Committee, used to play games like Yahtzee with Elsie at lunch since they didn’t play Bridge. Bobbie says that Elsie

had a great personality and taught her the “tricks of the trade.”

After Elsie retired, Bobbie and Terry would visit her once a year around Christmas. They would go to lunch, then return to Elsie’s house and chat about old times.

“It was kind of a ritual since she retired,” says Bobbie. “We’re going to miss it very much.”

One of five children, Elsie grew up in Overlea, Md., and attended Overlea High School. She and Larry met when they played on duckpin bowling teams. Not surprisingly, Elsie was also a top bowler. “This woman could do anything,” says Larry. “[She was] an absolutely amazing person. They only come along every once in a while.”

The PT Department is sure glad that she did.

# The Job Search

PT follows the experiences of three graduates from the Class of 1999 as they search for their first physical therapy jobs.

It's no secret that the job market for physical therapists has changed quite drastically. Just a few years ago, many students had jobs lined up before graduation. But today, that's not the case. As our three graduates discovered, the market is tighter; connections can be important, and what you expect may not always be what you get.

## Fresh from graduation

Before graduating in May 1999, Jeff LaPlume, Kenya Lane, and Julie Miller knew what kind of jobs they wanted. They had hopes and dreams. After graduation, none of them had jobs, but they weren't worried. Something would come up. It had to.

For Jeff LaPlume, 34, his ideal first job would be working in a hospital setting, either in acute care, rehabilitation or, better yet, neurological rehabilitation. He would like to work with other therapists who could provide professional support rather than work at a clinic as the only therapist.

"But of course, at this point, I'm very flexible," he said. "I would take just about anything."

In April 1999, LaPlume sent out dozens of resumes and applications. He hoped to work out West and applied with New Mexico Health Resources and the Public Health Service. He also sent resumes to hospitals in the Four Corners area and to one in Montana, where his father lives.

"I did some follow-up calls today, and they weren't too promising," LaPlume said last May. "Basically [they said] 'You'll have to wait.' People seem to want you to have your license in hand before they're even interested. That makes me kind of apprehensive. Two years ago, they were taking you before you were even out of school. Now, you just have to wait and maybe serve coffee at Starbucks in between."

Kenya Lane's story is a bit different. While a student at University of Maryland, Baltimore, she applied for a scholarship through a hospital; they would pay for one year of her schooling

and her licensure, and she would owe them one year of work after graduation. Lane was set. Or so she thought.

Shortly after graduation, Lane, 25, called the hospital to check on her job to make sure that everything was going smoothly. It wasn't. They asked if she could give them until July 1 to let her know.

"It didn't dawn on me that I would be working there [only] if there was a position open," said Lane. "[The job] is still up in the air; it's not definite. Now I think I have to go through the job search, which I thought I [wouldn't] have to do until I took my second job."

Julie Miller, 23, started realizing how tight the job market was during her affiliation. In March 1999, she seriously began considering the military. She spoke with representatives

from the Navy and was impressed. Miller said that they seemed to be hard-working, top-notch and dedicated to their jobs.

Miller took the Navy physical, but the Navy closed out applications because they had received so many. In October, she could apply for the officer's boot camp. But no one could tell her how many spots, if any, would be open for physical therapists.

Also last March, Miller sent out resumes. When she made follow-up calls, one woman said that they would keep her resume on file for three years. That was Miller's reality check.

# Search Job Job

“Before I got into PT school I thought ‘Won’t it be great that when I graduate from school I won’t have to compete with my classmates for jobs as in other professions,’” said Miller. “It’s so ironic that it changed so much—we are competing now.”

“I think you just really have to have connections in this market,” she added.

## The search is over

Jeff LaPlume ended up with two jobs after graduation—though not at the same time. When LaPlume was in the process

of moving to his father’s home, he received a call from Kalispell Regional Medical Center in Montana. They had positions available. LaPlume had a telephone interview and a second in-person interview. He was offered a part-time position.

For a couple months, LaPlume worked at Kalispell gaining experience. Then another job offer came, as he says, “out of the blue.”

LaPlume received a phone call from Life Course Rehabilitation Services in Farmington, New Mexico, an outpatient clinic owned by the San Juan Regional Medical Center. They asked if he was interested in a full-time position. Again, LaPlume went through a telephone interview and then interviewed for the position

in person. He got the job and now works as a staff physical therapist at the clinic.

LaPlume’s supervisor is a woman with whom he worked during an internship at the Northern Navaho Medical Center in New Mexico in fall 1998. When Life Course needed a new employee and they were sifting through resumes, she recognized LaPlume’s name and said that they worked well together.

“Right now, I think this is perfect for me,” says LaPlume. “I’m looking forward to getting a few years under my belt and expanding from there.”

When Kenya Lane checked back with the hospital, she got bad news. Their budget was reworked, and the job she expected was no longer available. Although she didn’t have to repay them for her schooling, she did have to find a job.

"If I didn't have something by September," says Lane, "I knew I would start worrying."

Lane sent out resumes responding to classified ads and received a lot of calls offering part-time positions, which she declined. She went on two interviews—one with an orthopedic outpatient facility and one with a nursing home. Because she would be the only therapist at the orthopedic facility, she declined the offer. The nursing home since hired someone else. But her third interview was the charm.

Lane heard through a friend, Sonya Worthy-Okolo '92, the director of Physical Therapy at the Mitchellville Office of the Physical Therapy and Sports Assessment Center, that their office needed a physical therapist. Years ago, Lane had volunteered at another of the center's offices, so they knew her. She interviewed and was offered the job.

Although she had expected to work at a hospital, Lane says that she's not disappointed. "I'm really learning a lot," says Lane. "I like the diversity of patients...I am happy."

Julie Miller was still focused on the Navy when Chris Glavaris '88, co-owner of Advanced Care Physical Therapy, said that they were looking for a physical therapist and asked her to send her resume. Miller knew Glavaris

through the University's PT Alumni Board, on which she had been a student member for three years.

Miller went on an interview and, one month later, was asked to come in and evaluate a patient. Although Miller says the evaluation was a bit nerve wracking, she was more relaxed since she knew that if this job didn't come through, she could always join the Navy.

But then she was offered the job. The Navy, for now, would have to wait.

"I never thought I'd be in a smaller clinic; I always thought I'd be in a larger facility, but I really love it," says Miller. She has the distinction of being the first full-time physical therapist that they've hired. Although her job at Advanced Care isn't what she expected to be doing after graduation, Miller is pleased.

"I feel like there's a lot of opportunity, a lot of room for professional growth, and that's just ideal for a new grad," says Miller. "I feel lucky to work at such a great place."

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## In life, one thing is certain: change

Greetings to all of you. I hope you were able to take part in some of our activities during Physical Therapy Month. We were glad to see so many of you involved.

I would like to take this opportunity to talk to you about one of the events during the month that initiated discussion of some important issues. On October 5, 1999, Joe Black, senior vice president of APTA's Education

Division, and Jody Gandy, director of the Department of Physical Therapy Education at APTA, facilitated an open forum on two topics: *The Transitional Postprofessional DPT: Thinking in the Future Tense* and *Alternative Models in Clinical Education: Dare to Innovate*. Many alumni and other area clinicians joined us for the forum and a discussion of these two issues of critical importance.

Joe Black described the rationale for and issues related to the Postprofessional Transitional DPT. His presentation was based on the work of a consensus conference on the Postprofessional Clinical Doctorate. Participants discussed how this postprofessional education opportunity may affect them, the intended outcomes of such a program, and the alternative ways postprofessional education opportunities may be configured. We currently offer an MPT postprofessional opportunity in our program. Participants voiced their opinions on a wide range of issues, including concerns about the impact of having DPT therapists in the job market, and what would be different about the DPT graduate.

These are among the many issues we have to address in considering the DPT for our program. We, as a faculty, see the move to the DPT as being in the best interest of the program, the University and, especially, the profession. If the DPT is oriented toward producing an independent practitioner, it would likely open the door for more job opportunities. Although most clinicians are likely to see the change as untimely and unnecessary, the opening of new markets by no longer relying solely on insurance and government reimbursement would be beneficial to us all. The issue of prospective student interest in DPT-level education is critical enough that if we delay such a move for any

reason, the ongoing changes in health care provider roles, reimbursement practices and growing competition in the education realm may severely alter our ability to continue to provide training opportunities to Maryland citizens.

We need you, our alumni, to understand that we view this as a "life or death" issue for the program, which is why we need your active participation. Our applicants are already asking about the availability of a DPT. Seven other institutions currently offer the degree, and 20 more are in the works. It is obvious to us that the DPT is here, and we need to decide how best to address it. We have started drafting a new entry-level DPT curriculum in order to get vital feedback from all of our stakeholders. Any new degree offering would, of course, be accompanied by the opportunity for current clinicians to transition to the new standard. We are actively seeking your input on what types of transitional opportunities would best address your needs.

Jody Gandy led a discussion of current and future issues related to the delivery of quality clinical education through the exploration of two alternative clinical education models. Information presented was based on the work of a consensus-based conference on Alternative Models of Clinical Education. Participants had the opportunity to explore the self-contained and independent/separate clinical education models in greater detail and to contemplate how these models could be applied in their current environment.

Frankly, we are experiencing a crisis in clinical education as a result of downsizing and the consequent restrictions on student mentors. New approaches must be found.

You, our alumni, are one of our most important stakeholders. Your input on these issues is critical to the development of a DPT degree and clinical education model at the University of Maryland, Baltimore that ensures high quality and benefits the citizens of Maryland. Part of our vision is providing quality education that offers opportunities at multiple levels for academic and professional development, and life-long learning. ## Kendall Physical Therapy Collection Established

Although Florence Kendall is well known the world over for her ground-breaking work in Physical Therapy, her roots are here in Maryland. Her contributions as a clinician, author and educator began in 1932 and continue today. Along with her many activities, Kendall was a part-time faculty member at the University of Maryland, Baltimore from 1957 to 1971, and has provided lectures for our department since that time. Though she will celebrate her 90th birthday in May, Kendall continues to be active in the profession, giving workshops across the country. She was awarded an honorary doctorate during the 1999 graduation exercises at the University. We were pleased to present her with the voluntary faculty title at the rank of Clinical Professor as of July 1999. And we are also proud to have her as the newest member of our Alumni Association. Her energy and

commitment to excellence are an inspiration to all of us and so we are particularly delighted that Professor Florence Kendall has chosen to house her archives here at the University of Maryland.

The Kendall Physical Therapy Collection, as it will be named, will be located in our beautiful new Health

Medicine, serving 10 southeastern states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. It contains well over 300,000 volumes and 2,900 current journals. The HSHSL moved into new, state-of-the-art facilities in April 1998. The library is open seven days a week, including most holidays.

During weekdays it is open until 10 p.m. Selections from the Kendall collection will be featured in a book exhibit to coincide with Kendall's birthday this spring and with Physical Therapy Month observance, in October 2000. Exhibit cases are located on the third and fourth floor landings of the main central staircase and, therefore, will serve to promote the Kendall collection in the most central public area of the library. We are excited to house this special collection at Kendall's home academic institution, the University of Maryland.

**Kendall's collection includes substantial works in the areas of anatomy, manual muscle testing and therapeutic exercise. The textbook she and her husband Henry authored, *Muscle, Testing and Function* is housed in seven languages.**

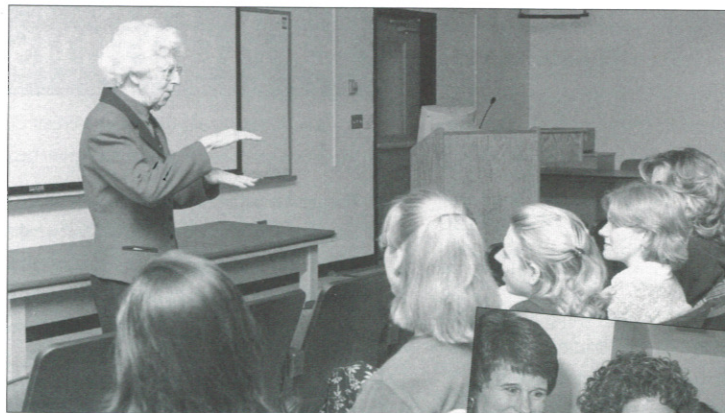

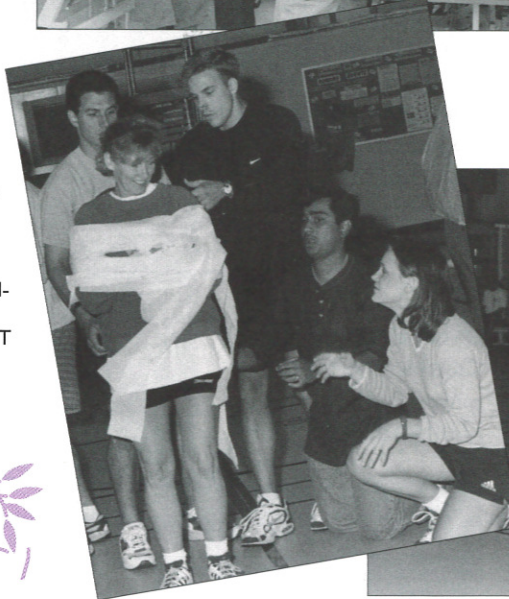

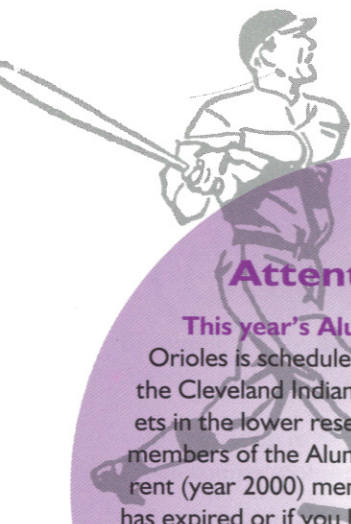

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## Continuing Education Calendar

### March 24-25, 2000

This course will be an interdisciplinary effort between the professions of physical therapy and dentistry. The temporomandibular joint (TMJ) will be the topic for the two-day course. ### Summer 2000

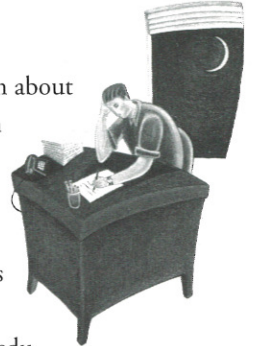
