School of Medicine To Celebrate 200 Years

Next year, the University of Maryland School of Medicine will be celebrating its 200th anniversary and will be hosting a variety of educational programs, community outreach initiatives and social events in commemoration of its founding in 1807. The Bicentennial Gala will be the highlight of this year-long celebration.

Opportunities

The Physical Therapy & Rehabilitation Science Department is seeking outstanding applicants for three non-tenure track faculty positions. Physical therapy license, Maryland eligibility, and a post-professional doctoral degree are required.

<u>Clinical Education Faculty Position:</u>

This is a full-time faculty position at the Instructor or Assistant Professor level, non-tenure track. In addition to clinical education, responsibilities will also include service to the department and teaching. Requirements include: at least five years of clinical experience, strong skills in clinical instruction, organization, communication and administration. Clinical instructor credentialing and Center Coordinator of Clinical Education (CCCE) experience preferred.

Teaching Faculty Positions:

Two faculty positions are available with teaching and clinical responsibilities in one or more of the following areas: clinical orthopedics, clinical neurology, geriatrics, pediatrics. We seek persons who are excited about teaching with primary responsibility in the entry-level DPT curriculum and clinical work. Clinical specialization from the ABPTS is preferred.

PTRS ended the self-study period for renewal of it's accreditation with a site visit. A team of site visitors spent three days with PTRS, meeting with a host of individuals associated with the program, including students, adjunct faculty, clinical faculty (CCCEs & CIs), employers, and the academic faculty. At the conclusion of their site visit, the team presented a preliminary report of their findings. This report was extremely favorable to our program, with positive comments regarding the collegiality of the department, the quality of our students as interns and employees, and the overall system of education we have put into place.

The next step in this process is a written report from the site team. This report, along with any remarks PTRS makes in response to this report, will be a part of the evidence taken into consideration by the Commission in making a final judgment on the accreditation status of the Program.
